Alpha Beta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha held its first official meeting in the Windsor Room of the Marcus Whitman Hotel on July 7, 1941. Thirteen members were present, but the chapter boasted a total membership of eighteen. JOSEPHINE FLAHERTY was the chapter's first President. It seems almost an omen that barely two months after this first meeting, Alpha Beta's president Josephine, was elected to the office of Washington State Vice President at the convention in Spokane on September 20 -21, 1941. From 1943 to 1945 there was no state President due to World War II. During the war years, Alpha Beta was extremely active and received much publicity both locally and in the Jonquil for the work done for U.S.O., Victory Belles, McCaw Hospital, War Bond Drives, and many other activities.
